What is the Pokémon Primary Schools' Cup?

The Pokémon Primary Schools' Cup is the largest primary-aged schools' cup competition in England, with over 5,000 school teams and over 50,000 children taking to pitches across England to play in this huge tournament.

The U11 Schools' Cup, U11 Girls' Cup and U11 Small Schools' Cup competitions provide a pathway for teams to progress through three rounds of competition. The top 24 teams will have the opportunity to travel to the National Finals, where the National Champions will be crowned. The competition embraces and promotes the ESFA's "15 Benefits" of schools' football including, but not limited to -



Providing opportunities to develop positive relationships



Helping children to feel they are part of a team




Encouraging teamwork

The ESFA's partnership with Pokémon gives the Primary Schools' Cup competitions an exciting identity and creates new experiences for players and teachers alike.



How does it work?

The local District Schools' FA (this can be the local District Schools' FA, School Games Organiser, School Sports Partnership, etc) will run a tournament for the primary/middle schools within its membership using any or all of the categories listed.

How you do this will be determined by how many teams you have taking part. If you have a small number of teams, then you may be able to achieve this as a one day tournament. If you are working with a larger number of teams, then you may decide to run this via several qualifying tournaments which lead to a District Finals day.

The winners of the District Final will be invited to participate at the County Finals where the winners of other Districts from within the County will also be invited to compete.

Categories:

The categories of competition that are offered are as follows:

- U11 7-a-side School Teams' Cup (for boys and girls)
- U11 7-a-side Schools' Cup for Girls (girls only competition)
- U11 Small Schools' Cup

For schools with fewer than 65 pupils in total in Years 5 and 6 according to the numbers on roll as confirmed by the preceding year's summer census. Schools that qualify for the Small Schools' Cup may enter that competition OR the Schools' Cup for School Teams - not both

Safeguarding

All tournament organisers are advised to produce a risk assessment for hosting the event and share it with the participating school teams. Tournament Pathway and Date Structure

The tournament pathway of the ESFA Pokémon Primary Schools' Cup is as follows:

District Rounds

(Inter-School categories only)

September - December: the local District Schools' FA will stage a competition for schools in its membership. The winning schools shall be invited to compete at the County Finals.

County Rounds

By 27 January 2024:
the local County Schools'
FA will stage a competition
for the District winners
within its County SFA
affiliated membership.
The county winners will be
invited to compete at the
Regional Finals.

Regional Finals

By 23 March 2024: the ESFA will organise regional finals for the county champion teams. The winners and runnersup of the Regional Finals will be invited to compete at the National Finals in May.

National Finals

The ESFA and Pokémon will use best endeavors to secure a Premier League or Football League stadium to host the National Finals in May. The last few seasons have seen the finals held at Leicester City, Stoke City, Coventry City and Birmingham City.

National Finalists 2023 - 2024

At the National Finals, in May, the 8 qualify teams in each category of competition, will be split into 2 groups of 4 teams and will play each once in the league phase. A win will earn 3 points, a draw will earn 1 point and a defeat will earn 0 points. The winners and runners-up of each group will qualify to participate in the national semi-final. The winners of Group A will play the runners-up in Group B and vice versa. The winners of the two semi-final fixtures will play in the national final to determine the champions of England. Extra time of 2 x 3 minute periods and penalty kicks will be used, if necessary, to determine winning teams in the knockout section of the competition. Participating teams will be required to submit a squad list with dates of birth, so the ESFA can check player eligibility. All appropriate documentation regarding the national finals will be sent to the national finalists before the school Easter holidays

Rules

The ESFA recognises that some compromises regarding the rules may be required in order for local delivery to take place, but we encourage consistency where possible. The following are some important notes relating to the rules for you to adopt at your tournaments:

- The tournament is a 7-a-side competition
- Teams can select from a squad of 10 (three named substitutes are allowed for each match)
- Repeated substitutions are allowed in each match (so if a player comes off, then they become a sub)
- Players must be under 11 and over 9 years of age at midnight on 31 August/1 September in the playing season to be eligible to participate in this competition (school Years 5 and 6 only)
- A 60 × 40 yard pitch size is recommended (full sized pitches split into thirds or quarters is acceptable)
- 12ft x 6ft goalposts will be used (availability will dictate the size of your goal posts (7 ft high x 16 ft wide is acceptable and is age appropriate)
- Tournaments may be played on 3G or 4G pitches provided that the venue holds a valid test certificate and appears on The FA's register of artificial pitches to view the register visit http://3g.thefa.me.uk/

- A size 4 ball shall be used
- Players' shirts shall be numbered where possible. It is acknowledged that some primary school football kits are not numbered
- In District and County Rounds, the host association will appoint the referees
- In the Regional and National Finals the ESFA will appoint the referees
- Matches will consist of two periods of seven minutes each (this will be dependent of venue availability and the number of participating teams)





- Teams should play in a league format followed by a knockout section (i.e. the winners and runners-up from each group will go forward to play in a semi-final, followed by a final)
- In the league phase, a win will earn three points, a draw one point and a defeat 0 points
- If teams finish level in the group phase, then the position shall be decided by goal difference
- If points and goal difference are level, then the position shall be decided by goals scored
- If teams are level on points, goal difference and goals scored, then the qualifying team shall be decided by a play-off (or a penalty shoot-out if time does not allow for a full play off)
- If scores are level at the end of a knockout fixture, extra time of three minutes each way shall be played. If scores remain level after extra time, the winners shall be determined by taking kicks from the penalty mark (FIFA rules)
- The rule relating to offside does not apply to this competition
- The 'retreat' rule relating to goal keeper kicks applies in this competition. This means that when a goalkeeper takes a goal kick off the ground, the opponents must retreat to their own half of the pitch unless the goalkeeper decides to take the kick early.
